>Obey the speed limits, especially on residential streets, remember it is summertime and the children are out playing!

Please be a good neighbor and clean up after your pet. You will also be eliminating the possibility of a fine!

Important Reminder

We ask that all residents read the following reminders to assist us in keeping the City's storm sewers clear of debris and hazardous materials.

We can all be a part of the solution to storm water pollution if we practice common sense in our daily routines.



Some examples are:

 When mowing grass, <u>avoid blow-ing grass clippings into the street</u>. They clog drainage basins and storm pipes.

- • <u>Never</u> drain antifreeze, motor oil or paint into a storm basin or storm sewer.
- <u>Never</u> dispose of any household chemicals or any animal waste into the storm system.

<u>Fertilizer Use</u> - Fertilizing right before it rains may seem like a good idea, but if the rainfall amount is heavy the fertilizer will not have time to soak into the soil and will wash off into the local rivers, creeks and ditches, often through storm drains. It will also wash off if you fertilize too often or too much at once, wasting your money.

Fire Hydrant Flushing & Testing

Fire hydrants are flushed once a year to avoid rust build-up in the waterlines and to insure adequate fire protection. Hydrants will be flushed on a rotating basis, <u>each Thursday</u> throughout the year. <u>Since the location of the testing varies from</u> week to week, residents are asked to check their tap water on Thursdays before doing laundry, to avoid the possibility of rust coming through the lines.

For those residents who do laundry during the time of testing, a rust remover is available and can be picked up at Town Hall if needed.



SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

School is out and summer is here! Please have a fun and safe season, and watch out for our younger citizens who will be playing and celebrating during their summer vacation from school.



Peg Ryan, James Bagdonas, and Doug Meeker attended the Tree City USA awards ceremony. The awards ceremony was cohosted by the Mercer County Villages of Rockford, Coldwater and Fort Recovery and their Tree Commissions.

At that **time** the City of Waterville was recognized as a Tree City USA. This it he 16th time that the City of Waterville has been honored with this nationally recognized award.

The awards were presented to the Tree City USA communities by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Division of Forestry at the Rockford Community Building. The title of "Tree City USA" was bestowed upon our community for its ongoing efforts to maintain and

improve the quality of life through a comprehensive street tree management program. The program is guided by the Tree Commission and the municipal government.

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Division of Forestry acts as a guiding hand in helping a community to become qualified as a Tree City USA. The Urban Forester recommends a community to the Arbor Day Foundation for this standing. In order to achieve the title and the honors, a community must meet four standards: a Tree Ordinance; an active Tree Commission or forestry department; a comprehensive urban forestry program supported by a minimum of two dollars per capita; and an annual Arbor Day proclamation and activity.

The State of Ohio currently boasts the greatest number of Tree Cities in the country with a grand total this past year of 249. 52 of Northwest Ohio's communities are Tree Cities and were recognized for their achievements at the Rockford awards ceremony.

Mary who is autistic takes weekly art lessons at Bountiful Art and she has worked with Anthony Wayne High School art teacher Carrie Flagg. "She

has such an interesting perspective that comes out in her drawings and in her sculptures. She doesn't verbalize things - it comes out in her art" Flagg said. Karen Wiggins (right) Manager of the Waterville Branch Library proudly helped Mary hold up the new flag for all to see.

Jason Diver (right), a charter member of the Waterville Tree Commission, was also recognized for his service to the city as part of the Arbor Day celebration. Wakeman Archives Summer Hours

Signs, Signs, Nowhere Signs!



When you take a drive through Waterville, you may notice The most popular area of public property for posting temporary there's something missing - something many other cities in our area have in abundance. Fortunately, this particular absence makes Waterville a much cleaner, more attractive community.

In most other cities, its rather easy to locate signs of all sizes, shapes and colors. You find them nailed to the power poles, to the trees, and to all manner of stakes and poles stuck in the ground. Most of the signs are hand-lettered announcements for events such as garage sales, advertisements for rental property, advertisements of vehicles for sale, or business advertisements. You name it; someone has probably posted a sign for it !

In some of our neighboring cities, you'll see so many signs posted in the same location that they overlap each other, rendering most of the signs unreadable. Worse, the signs are seldom removed once the event is over. They usually remain in place until they deteriorate from rain and wind. Eventually, they're blown down by the elements, only to become litter on the streets. Clearly, temporary signs are a nuisance that, left unchecked, become a blight on the community.

To prevent this from becoming a problem in Waterville, the police department and other city employees enforce ordinance §1315.08(j), which prohibits posting temporary signs on public property.

signs is the boulevard or street lawn area. This is generally the grassy area between the public sidewalk and the edge of the street. The existing ordinance prohibits any temporary sign, except those posted by government, from being erected without permission from the City.

But there are two exceptions - two locations the City Council has identified as acceptable for temporary signs. One location is the grassy median where Edgerton and Wilkshire meet Michigan Ave. The other location is Canal Street and the Anthony Wayne Trail. At these two locations, temporary signs may be erected.

The Waterville Police Department has been very aggressive about removing temporary signs from the city right of way. Officers do attempt to educate individuals about the ordinance. But in many cases, the signs are simply removed and disposed of.

Enforcement of this particular ordinance may seem too minor of an infraction to occupy the time and attention of the police department. But in order to keep Waterville from becoming a collage of assorted signs, enforcement is necessary.





UNLIMITED TRASH PICK-UP

The Semi-Annual Unlimited Garbage Pick-up is scheduled for Waterville residents on: Monday, June 18th

Residents are requested to have all properly prepared materials curbside by 7 a.m.

Exclusions:

Curbside collection **excludes** the following materials:

- Yard Waste (including brush, grass, leaves, shrubs)
- Building materials (including paint, concrete, metal pipes and rocks)
- Liquids of any kind
- Hazardous Chemicals (including pesticides and insecticides)
- Dead animals
- Motor oil, Auto Parts and Tires

Appliances: Residents are responsible for the removal of all Freon refrigerants from applicable appliances prior to collection by the contractor. A certification label must be affixed to the appliance. This requirement is mandatory by Federal Law.



Large, bulky items such as furniture and appliances will not require a bulk item sticker on this day only.

ZONING MATTERS





The following topics are intended to prompt a review of Ordinances or a call to the Municipal Office to have questions answered before a project is begun.

SIGNS: Garage Sale/ Yard Sale signs are NOT allowed on utility poles, traffic or street signposts or the PUBLIC RIGHT OF WAY. Garage Sale / Yard Sale signs (4 square feet maximum sign area) may be erected for the days the sale is being held up to 72 consecutive hours. No signs (for sale, for rent, political campaign), other than government or traffic, are allowed in the Public Right of Way.

RECREATIONAL VEHICLES OR BOATS: May not be parked in a front yard or in front of a main residential structure. Please refer to §1145.03(j) for more details or call the Municipal Office (419) 878-8100 with questions.

POOLS: Zoning Permits are needed for all pools EXCEPT temporary pools that are less than 18" in depth, 115 square feet in area, and erected between May 1 and September 15. Hot tubs, home spas, and whirlpool tubs less than 150 square feet in area are exempt.

STRUCTURES (sheds, play houses): A Zoning Permit is required (obtain from Municipal Office) and a building permit may also be needed. Please call the Municipal Office (419) 878-8100 for additional information.

FENCES: If your home is located in an area that has a home owners association, check the association fence rules. Fences to be located in a FLOODPLAIN must have a FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPEMNT PERMIT. All other locations in the City do not require a permit. The only regulation to consider applies to fences that might be located in a front yard or a corner lot. Maintaining a 25' clear sight area for motorists is required.

BLUE BIRD: Waterville residents and property owners are reminded that the Blue Bird tracks are not a "dumping site". The tracks are a small part of the 80' wide strip of private property the Blue Bird leases from the Norfolk Southern Railroad. According to Waterville law (§521.08 (a)), littering is not allowed on any private or public property. This includes the area along the Blue Bird tracks. Litter includes grass clippings, garden waste, yard waste, tree branches and leaves.

WHY DOES

MY BACKYARD FLOOD?

To keep water away from the house foundation, the ground on all four sides are sloped down from the house. If the property is large enough, the run off water is reabsorbed into the subsurface and recharges the water table, without effecting the house foundation.

In the case of present day subdivisions, building lots are too small and concentrated for this to happen. The addition of roads to service these subdivisions provides a solution to this problem. Storm sewer systems that drain the roadways also provide outlets for backyard and side yard areas of the building lots and for the sump pumps located in the basements. In the newest subdivisions the catch basins are located in the back corners of every two lots.

In older subdivisions this space may be 4 to 6 lots. The back of the lots are set to grade to help drain to these catch basins, this area is often referred to as a drainage easement. Except for other utilities such as electric, gas, phone, cable TV, etc. that share this easement, no buildings, sheds, or trees should be installed in this area.

The height of the ground should not be changed without first reviewing the drainage map for your area and the established grade elevations. Remember, if you make any changes to your property you could cause an adverse effect on a neighbors property even 3 lots away from you. Some building lots in the City do not have access to the storm sewer systems and therefore rely on the surrounding ground to provide drainage for those lots.

If you are having backyard drainage problems, here are some items to consider to help solve the problem:

- a) Is your property part of an established drainage system? Some backyards are part of a detention basin and are designed to hold water in heavy storms
- b) Is your property graded correctly to drain to the catch basin?

- c) Did someone change the drainage plan by adding dirt, sheds, trees, catch basin plugged, etc. on their property?
- d) If you are not part of an established drainage system, is the ground on your property frozen? (early spring rains can cause flooding if the ground is still frozen), or mostly impervious (heavy clay or rocky subsurface).
- e) Is your property graded to drain water away from your house? (a word of caution here, you may not run water onto a neighbors property except through an established drainage system)
