

# PROPER CARE FOR YOUR TREES

#### **Trimming and Pruning**

Trimming of trees located within the public right-of-way to a safe height (6'6" to 7') above the sidewalk and more extensive pruning may be requested by submitting a written request to:

Public Works Department c/o: Town Hall 25 N. Second Street

Waterville, OH, 43566

The Public Works Department will direct your request to the Waterville Tree Commission. Any tree limbs thought to be hazardous should be immediately reported to Town Hall at 419-878-8100 or the Public Works Department 878-8108.

#### **Mulching**

There are many benefits to mulching your trees. It helps maintain soil moisture and helps to control weeds. Some mulch can improve soil structure and drainage. Organic mulch is preferred to inorganic materials, due to the soil enhancing properties of organic materials.

If you choose to mulch the trees on your property, it is important that you do so properly. Too much mulch may actually harm the trees. Over-mulching or creating a "mulch volcano" may cause problems for trees, inviting insects and disease. It is better to mulch wide than mulch deep.

It is also important to keep the mulch away from the trunk of the tree. It is best to form a ring of mulch around the tree, (wrapping the tree in a donut shape) keeping the mulch six inches away from the trunk. A depth of two to four inches of mulch is generally recommended. This will hold water but won't invite insects and disease to infest the trunk.

#### **Watering**

With summer just around the corner and the onset of warm, dry weather, it is important to water the trees on your property. It is especially important for newly planted trees to get regular watering.

#### **More Information**

If you have questions regarding the topics covered here or other tree information, there are many resource pamphlets from the International Society of Arboriculture available at Town Hall.

#### **Department Seeks Federal Grant Money:**

Recently, the federal government made over three hundred and fifteen million dollars available to fire departments all over the United States. This grant opportunity is known as the AFG, or Assistance to Firefighters Grant. For the 2019 grant cycle, the Waterville Fire Department is pursuing three grants, totalling more than \$930,000 dollars from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The grant request is seeking three items the department is needing to replace including portable radios, a compressor and SCBA fill station, and an open-cab fire engine that is 33 years old. These items play a tremendous part in the critical tasks our members are faced with. Lastly, it is our mission to explore other financial incentives to bring top quality services and equipment to the residents we serve.

#### **Safety Starts with Action:**

As people turn their clocks forward for the start of daylight saving time, the American Red Cross asks everyone to also test their smoke alarms. "This weekend, please 'turn and test' to help protect your family from home fires, which tragically take seven lives each day in the U.S.," said Trevor Riggen, Senior Vice President, Red Cross Disaster Cycle Services. "Because working smoke alarms can cut the risk of dying in a home fire by half, we urge you to test your smoke alarms and practice your escape plan with everyone in your household.

#### Turn and Test for Safety:

The threat of home fires - which are most often caused by Cooking and heating equipment - increases with the holidays And cold weather. This weekend, please prepare your Household by following the steps below. For more information Visit redcross.org/home fires or download the free Red Cross Emergency App (search "American Red Cross" in app stores).



- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home.
   Place them inside and outside bedrooms, and sleeping areas.
- Test smoke alarms and replace batteries if needed.
  - Test smoke alarms monthly, and change the batteries at least once a year, if your model requires it. It's also a great time to check carbon monoxide alarms.
- Practice your home fire escape plan. Include at least two ways to get our of every room. Select a meeting spot at a safe
   Distance away from your home, such as a neighbor's home or landmark like a specific tree in your front yard, where
   Everyone can meet. Practice your plan until everyone can escape in two minutes or less.

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Waterville Fire with Record Breaking Incidents:

Emergency incidents during 2019, and increase of 30
Incidents from 2018. In 2016, the department
Responded to just under 600 incidents, and increase
Of 23% in incidents in just over a four year period.
Department leaders and the city administration are
In the process of exploring new staffing options to
Meet this growing trend. By the end of 2020, the
City's population is expected to grow by more than

#### **TORNADO TERMINOLOGY**

Funnel Cloud: A violently rotating column of air that descends from the base of a severe thunder storm, but is not in contact with the ground.

Tornado: A funnel cloud that touches the ground, normally funnel-shaped with the narrow end toward the ground.

Hearing a tornado siren can be extremely frightening. What's even more frightening is
not knowing what to do in the event of a tornado sighting. Keep in mind that tornadoes can occur at any time of the day or night, at any
time of the year. So be prepared!

#### **TORNADO FACTS**

- Ohio averages 16 tornadoes each year.
- The greatest number of tornadoes in Ohio occurred in 1992 when 59 touched down statewide.
- Ohio's peak tornado season runs from April through mid-July. Statewide statistics show that June and July have been the most active months for tornadoes in the state.
- Most tornadoes occur in Ohio between 2:00 10:00 p.m.
- Tornadoes can approach from any direction, but in Ohio most move from southwest to northeast.
- Virtually all tornadoes come from thunderstorms and are usually preceded by heavy rains, lightning and hail.

#### **BEFORE A TORNADO**

Take time to complete an itemized inventory of your household furnishings and personal belongings. Also, photograph or videotape your rooms. This will prove invaluable in the event

of a loss. Keep these valuable records, along with receipts, off premises, preferably in a bank safe deposit box.

Prepare an evacuation plan with your entire family. Make sure you're familiar with the locations of the on/off switches for water, gas and electricity. Locate the safest area in your home in case of a tornado emergency. When skies look threatening, turn on your radio or TV for local reports warning of severe weather conditions.

If severe weather threatens, move vehicles under cover. This can help prevent damage from high winds, flying debris and hail.

#### **DURING A TORNADO**

Some places are safer than others when tornadoes threaten. When possible, take a flashlight and battery-operated radio when seeking shelter. Memorize safe locations now so you're not caught "off guard" if a tornado strikes.

In homes and other small buildings: Go to the center of the room on the lowest level, preferably a basement. Otherwise, go to a windowless closet, bathroom or inside hall, staying away from windows, doors and exterior walls. Get under a sturdy table or bench.

<u>In school</u>: A teacher will direct you to the designated tornado shelter. In a hallway, kneel on the floor facing the wall with your hands covering the back of your neck and head. Avoid auditoriums or gymnasiums with large roofs.

In cars, mobile homes or outside: Leave cars or mobile homes immediately! If you can't reach a building, lie flat in a ditch or low spot, covering your head and the back of your neck with your hands. Stay clear of tall trees and open water.

In malls or large buildings: If you can't locate a designated shelter area, go to a middle hall on the lowest level.

#### AFTER A TORNADO

Inspect your property and cars for damage. Check immediately for electrical problems and gas leaks, contacting appropriate utilities or the fire department as soon as possible. Notify relatives of your safety. If you don't, local authorities may waste time trying to find you.

When a tornado strikes, severe lightning will often be present. Lightning causes an average of 83 deaths and over 300 injuries in the U.S. each year. Ohio averages between 30-50 thunderstorm days a year, so its important to know what to do when lightning threatens.

When Outdoors: Avoid water (pools, lakes), metal objects (electric wires, fences, golf clubs, machinery, power tools, etc.), wide open spaces and high terrain (hilltops) and tall trees or objects.



#### LIGHTENING SAFETY TIPS

When Indoors: Avoid water (baths, showers. doing dishes or laundry), open doors and windows and using telephones and headsets. Unplug major electrical appliances like stereos, televisions, computers VCRs and DVD players.





# New Leash Law



As of February 14th, 2020 the City of Waterville passed ordinance code, 505.01(a)(5). The General Offense Code states that all dogs must be controlled at all times on a leash not more than six (6) feet long, when off their property. # Zoning Matters



Ordinance amending 505.01(a)(5) of the General Offenses Code states that all dogs must be "On Leash" controlled at all times on a leash not more than six (6) feet long!

ESTATESALE SIGNS! Garage Sale, yard sale, and other similar signs may be erected during the days that such garage Or yalu sale is peing conducted, provided that no such sign may be displayed for longer than 72 consecutive hours. Not more than three off-premises signs and one on-premises sign may be displayed for any garage or yard sale, and such signs shall not exceed four square feet n area or contain any advertising material unrelated to the sale. No such sign shall be attached in any way to any utility pole, traffic or street signpost, or tree in or along any street right-of-way within the Municipality

POOLS: All pools, in-ground or above ground require a permit. The only exception to this rule is pools that are less than 115 square feet (12' in diameter) in area and 18'' depth. A pool permit cost is the same as for a zoning permit 🥩 but qualifies the holder to apply for an exemption of the sanitary sewer portion of the water cost for water used to fill the pool. When filling a pool, record the beginning and ending meter reading and call this information into the Water Department (419-878-8101).



SHEDS: Any new building or building expansion requires a zoning permit from the City and may also require a building permit from Lucas County Building Regulations. Failure to obtain the required permit, before starting construction, doubles the cost of the permit.

NO GREEN! Keep yard waste, grass clippings, leaves and other organic materials off paved areas so these phosphorus sources do not enter storm drains and contribute to the LAKE ERIE ALGAL BLOOMS.



FENCES: The City of Waterville does not have fence regulations. There is a requirement to maintain a 36" high, 25' clear line of sight for corner lots which does apply to fences. A common oversight is failure to assure the location of the fence is on the appropriate property.



RECREATIONAL VEHICLES: Parking in driveways for campers, motor homes, camping trailers, boats and all other recreational vehicles and utility trailers is limited to 72 hours in a calendar week.









#### **Bicycles**

Each year there are numerous bicycles found and turned over to the Waterville Police Department. Most bicycles have no owner identification on them and go unclaimed.

Residents are encouraged to register their bicycles. with the Waterville Police Department. You will be given a license tag to display on your bicycle. Waterville residences can obtain bicycle license tags for FREE at the Waterville Police Department office 25 N. Second Street Waterville, Ohio 43566.



Report your stolen or missing bicycle promptly to the

Police Department.

#### Tips to prevent your bicycle from being stolen:

Never leave your bicycle unlocked even for a minute.

Use a bike lock. For the best protection, put the lock through both the frame and the front wheel when locking the bicycle to something. U-Locks are better than cable or chain locks both together are best.

Always secure your bicycle to a SOLID object.

Lock your bicycle in an open, well-lit area that can be seen by pedestrians and passing motorists.

Do not leave your bicycle in a rack overnight. Check the rack to see if is easy to take apart or broken at the top or bottom.

Be sure to secure any quick-release parts such as wheels or seat posts.

Frequent Question: Is there a Leash Law?

Actually, there is now a leash law in Waterville. The law requires dogs to be kept on a leash whenever they are off of the owner's property. The Ordinance amending 505.01 (a)(5) of the General Offences Code states that all dogs must be On Leash controlled at all times, on a leash not more that six (6) feet long. Ordinance 505.01 refers to any animal or fowl running at large on public property, or on private property without consent of the owner. That includes cats, chickens, ducks and even the occasional purple three headed newt! Very closely related to this are town other City ordinances. Section 505.08 requires the owner or caretaker of a dog or cat, or other animal to pick up any defecation let on public property or the property of another. In other words, if your dog, cat or other animal you are caring for leaves a pile on City property, or on private property of another, you are required by this section to remove it. And section 505.09 prohibits allowing a dog to create a nuisance by barking or howling.

## UTILITY PAYMENT OPTIONS




You have a couple of options that you can use to pay your City of Waterville Utility Payment.

You of course are always welcome to come in to the Municipal Building at 25 N. Second Street to pay with Cash, \*\*Check and also available at the Municipal Building you can pay with at \*Debit or Credit Card( there is a 3% convenience fee applied if you use a card. We also have 2 drop boxes for you if you would like to just drop off a payment. There is a silver collection box located across from our parking lot right next to the US Postal mail box. (Be careful every month we have a few folks to accidently put their payment in the wrong box, and it can be weeks before we get the payment from the Post Office if it shows up at all). There is also a night drop slot in the main lobby of the Municipal Building that drops directly into the offices.

\*\* If you are paying with a check PLEASE make sure you fill the check out correctly. Now with everyone so busy we have been receiving several checks that have been written out incorrectly. And if we don't catch it the bank will and they will send your check back to us. As you can imagine this can delay your payment being posted, our deposits need to be correct-

ed, we need to contact you to either get your permission to make the correction needed or you have to come in or drop off a new check. So as a rule of thumb please double check these 5 places 1) the date - proper month and year 2) that the check is made out to the City of Waterville, 3) that the amount written in the box is clear 4) and maybe the most important please make sure that the handwritten amount on the legal line matches the amount that you put in the box!! 5) And of course if you don't sign the check we can't cash it:) 6) and if you are not including your statements with the check please include your account numbers in the memo line.



And possibly the best option is to let us do all of the work for you!

Have your monthly water bill deducted directly from you savings or checking account! You will still receive your statement every month, and on the 15th of the month we will deduct the amount due directly from your account. You will never receive a late charge, and you don't have to remember what the date is. You can find the Automatic Payment form on our website www.waterville.org under Resources and Forms, and of course we also have them available in the office.

The Med Return box is located in the rear entrance of City Hall. It is available during normal City Hall business hours. Anyone (not just Waterville residents) may deposit unused prescription and OTC medications in the box.

The Med Return box will not accept pill bottles or packaging. So residents will need to empty the pills into the drop chute, then dispose of the containers themselves. Liquids and creams are not accepted.

The Med Return box was paid for by the AWAKE coalition. It cost \$695. Mac McCann at Public Works modified the drop chute to prevent pill bottles and other containers from being deposited.
