

#### **TRASH & RECYCLING SERVICES**

The City of Waterville has a contract with Republic Services to collect trash and recycled materials for residents of the city. Trash collection day is Monday and recycling is collected bi-weekly (see website for map). There are two unlimited pick-ups per year, one in the Spring/Summer and another in the Fall/Winter. The rates for collection is \$11.51 per month and is billed on your water/sewer bill. Bulk Item Tags—\$12.00 each / Extra Trash Tags—\$6.00 each


#### Appliances:

Residents are responsible for the removal of all Freon refrigerants from applicable appliances prior to collection by the contractor. A certification label must be affixed to the appliance. This requirement is mandatory by Federal Law.

Large, bulky items such as furniture and appliances will not require a bulk item sticker on this day only! Carpet/Rugs must be set out in 4' x 2' rolls (taped). Wood must be bundled in less than 4' lengths no more than 50 lbs.

## **TIPS FROM THE ZONING DEPARTMENT**

**PARKING**: Parking in driveways for campers, motor homes camping trailers, boats and all other recreational vehicles and utility trailers is limited to 72 hours in a calendar week.

**POULTRY AND LIVESTOCK:** Having chickens or animals, like a goat, is permissible in the City of Waterville. However, in doing so you must keep the critters on your property, properly house, feed and clean up after them (waste and litter must not be taken to the vard waste transfer facility (Clean Wood) or placed into household or unlimited trash). The presence of these "pets" must not produce offensive odors, noise, dust, attract flies or rodents, produce health hazards or anything that offends the public.

**GARAGE SALES:** Garage sale, vard sale, and other similar signs may be erected during the days that such garage or yard sale is being conducted, provided that no such sign may be displayed for longer than 72 consecutive hours. Not more than three off-premises signs and one on premises may be displayed for any garage or yard sale, and such signs shall not exceed four square feet in area or contain any advertising material unrelated to the sale. No such sign shall be attached in any way to any utility pole, traffic or street signpost, or tree in or along any street right-of-way within the Municipality.

**SHEDS:** Any new building or building expansion requires a zoning permit from the City and may also require a building permit from Lucas County Building Regulations. Failure to obtain the required permit, before starting construction, doubles the cost of the permits.

**FENCES:** The City of Waterville does not have fence regulations. There is a requirement to maintain a 36" high, 25' clear line of sight for corner lots which does apply to fences. A common oversight is failure to assure the location of the fence is on your property.

• **POOLS:** All pools, in-ground or above ground require a permit. The only exception to this rule are pools that are less than 115 square feet (12' in diameter) in area and 18" in depth. A pool permit cost is the same as for a zoning permit but qualifies the holder to apply for an exemption of the sanitary sewer portion of the water cost for water used to fill the pool. When filling a pool, record the beginning and ending meter reading



2022 will be a busy year for public improvement projects in the City of Waterville. The City received \$1,361,038 in grant funding to complete construction projects in 2022! Some of these projects include:

<u>Parker Square/Memorial Park</u>. As planning began for the replacement of the old Waterville Bridge, planning also began for the redevelopment of Memorial Park along the Maumee River. The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT), needing an area to stage construction equipment, agreed to tear down the old Waterville School at their cost if the City agreed to let the general contractor, Miller Brothers of Archbold, Ohio, use the area for the duration of the bridge replacement project. In March 2021, the new Waterville Bridge was officially completed at a cost of 13.4 million dollars. During the bridge replacement project, a "Public Square Planning Committee" was formed consisting of City Officials and local residents to develop a master plan for the redevelopment of the park. After several public meetings, the plan was completed in November 2019.

The park redevelopment will consist of two phases: Parker Square, between School Court and School Place, is Phase 1 and Memorial Park, between the bridge and School Place is Phase 2. The main focal point of Parker Square will be the "Outlook" which will be centered in the middle of park along the Maumee River. As the name suggests, it is an area designed to provide a gathering point for public access for viewing the Maumee River. The City envisions this area to become "Waterville's Front Yard" and become a centralized gathering place for community events in the future and contribute to the further redevelopment of the downtown area. The Outlook and adjacent lawn area are designed to accommodate several hundred people for outdoor events or concerts. Construction has started on Phase 1 and is expected to be complete by September 2022. The cost of Phase 1 is \$560,000. The City has received a total of \$300,000 in grants and donations for this project.

<u>Anthony Wayne Trail Intersections Improvement Project.</u> This project involves adding a right turn lane on Mechanic St. onto the north bound lane of the Anthony Wayne Trail as well as adding a right turn lane on the south bound lane of the Anthony Wayne Trail to Farnsworth Road. The City will be adding a multi-use path on the west side of the Anthony Wayne Trail between Farnsworth and Mechanic. The project will also involve new traffic signals and poles. The cost of this project is \$821,728 with the City receiving \$810,500 in federal and state grants toward the project cost. Completion of this project is expected by October 2022.

<u>River Road Sanitary Sewer Pumping Station Improvement</u>. The City received a grant from the State of Ohio of \$88,100 to make improvements to the River Road Pumping Station located at 322 N. River Road. The project will replace existing pumps and valves from the 1970's and 1980's which need replacement. The cost of this project is approximately \$109,000. This project is expected to be finished by the Fall of 2022.

<u>Urban Tree Canopy Restoration Project</u>. The City received a \$25,000 "Urban Tree Canopy Restoration Grant" from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources to plant approximately 142 trees throughout the City. The tree plantings will be concentrated in residential areas were the existing street tree coverage is less than 30%; that is streets with few or no trees. The City will not force residents to receive a street tree if they don't want one. This project will be completed in the Fall of 2022.

<u>Traffic Signal Improvement Project at St. Rt. 64 and U.S. 24.</u> This project was recently completed in May 2022. The project cost was \$178,526 with the City receiving a grant of \$87,478 from the State of Ohio. The project involved the installation of a traffic signal/intersection at the south bound off ramp of US 24 and St. Rt. 64. This project will enhance the safety of left turning movements off the expressway going east into Water-ville.

<u>Prairie Trail Park Path Resurfacing Project</u>. In 2022, the City will also be resurfacing the existing walking paths in Prairie Trail Park and building a new path extension in the park between the Fire Station and the new United Methodist Church to the intersection of Pray Blvd. and Waterville-Monclova Road. New pedestrian crosswalk beacons will also be installed at this location. The City received a \$49,960 grant from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources for this project which will cost \$66,614.



### City of Waterville Construction Projects in 2022 (continued)

**2022 Residential Paving Program**. In 2022, the City will make pavement improvements to Continental Drive, Heritage Lane, Colonial Court and the Alley between Farnsworth Road and South Street. Pavement rejuvenating agent will also be applied to the following streets paved last year: Maple Lane, Cherry Lane, Canal Court, a portion of South Third Street and the Alley between Mechanic Street and Farnsworth Road behind Zion Lutheran Church. All paving work should be complete by August 2022.

**Downtown Street Lighting Improvement Phase 7.** This project involves the installation of seven (7) streetlights in the downtown area: 2 on S. River Road between South and School Court; 2 on N. River Road between Mechanic and North Street.; 2 on S. Second St. between South and Farnsworth Road and 1 on the corner of the Anthony Wayne Trail and South Street at a cost of \$91,204. As of May 2022, this project is nearly 95% complete. Completion of this project will finalize the replacement of all of the original street lights in the downtown area.

<u>Waterworks Park Drainage Improvements.</u> Bids will be opened in June 2022 to make stormwater drainage improvements to Waterworks Park. Additional improvements will also be made to renovate the ballfield area. This work is expected to cost approximately \$45,000 and will be completed by the end of 2022.

## Tips for Severe Weather Season:

As summer temperatures start to rise, so does Ohio's severe weather potential. Historically, the month of June is Ohio's greatest chance of seeing strong storms that produce tornadoes. In June of 2010, an EF-4 rated tornado struck the area and resulted in multiple injuries and fatalities. Please, take the time to review your severe weather plan with your family, before severe weather strikes.

If you would like to follow and monitor the weather more closely, the Storm Prediction Center, or SPC, forecasts potential severe weather days in advance. It's always great to review severe weather terminology with your family as well. Recently, the National Weather Service has updated its language to better communicate with the public. The image on the following page highlights the new, most commonly used vocabulary. The biggest addition you will see is the term, "tornado emergency." In the event we would experience a confirmed tornado, local news and weather stations may use this terminology to notify the public.

**Tornado Watch:** Atmospheric conditions are favorable for possible tornadic development. Please be vigilant and monitor your local weather stations for rapidly changing conditions.

**Tornado Warning:** A rotating supercell has\_been identified by radar or trained weather spotters that have spotted a tornado or funnel cloud. Seek shelter immediately

**Tornado Emergency:** A confirmed, damaging tornado is in progress and is threatening human lives. You must shelter in the safest and strongest place possible. *See page 3 of this publication for Emergency Shelters located in the City of Waterville.* 

Please take time over the next few weeks to review this important information from the National Weather Service with your family.

### Warmer Seasons & Outdoor Fires: Understanding Ohio's Open Burn-Laws:



The Waterville Fire Department staff is frequently asked about such issues as open burning and recreational fires. The Department also responds to numerous incidents involving illegal, unsafe, or improper burning. Not only does the Ohio Fire Code address such issues, but the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency and local Air Pollution Control regulate such practices. For everyone's safety, we strongly recommend that you follow the regulations.

**"Recreational fires",** as defined in the Ohio Fire Code, are those "outdoor fires burning materials other than rubbish where the fuel being burned is not contained in an incinerator, outdoor fireplace, barbecue grill or barbecue pit and has a total fuel area of 3 feet or less in diameter and 2 feet or less in height for pleasure, religious, ceremonial, cooking, warmth or similar purposes. "The Ohio Fire Code defines open burning as "the burning of materials wherein products of combustion are emitted directly into the ambient air without passing through a stack or chimney from an enclosed chamber.

(Warmer Seasons & Outdoor Fires Cont.) Open burning does not include road flares, smudge pots, and similar devices associated with safety or occupational uses typically considered such as open flames, recreational fires, or use of portable outdoor fireplaces."

These types of fires are the most frequent types of incidents that the fire department responds to for complaints. The most common complaint from neighbors is when fires are not conducted in accordance with the rules and regulations, or when the environmental conditions cause the smoke to migrate off the property into the residence of a neighboring property. Persons with chronic breathing problems can be affected by these conditions.

### The following items below are important points to remember:

- Residents within the City limits of Waterville or within 1000 feet perimeter around the City cannot conduct Open Burning.
- The only material that can be burned is clean, dry wood as a fuel source. Absolutely no yard waste or rubbish materials can be burned.
- If the fire is contained within an approved container (i.e., outdoor fireplace, barbeque pit, etc.) the fire must be 15 feet from a structure or combustible materials (i.e., picnic table, lawn furniture, etc.).
- For an open fire (recreational fire no container), the fire must be 20 feet from a structure (this includes, but is not limited to: wood fences, detached garages, utility sheds, residential dwelling units, neighboring structures, or combustible materials).
- Conditions that could cause a fire to spread within 25 feet of the fire must be eliminated prior to ignition of a fire.
- The fire must be attended while burning, which includes smoldering fires.
- A fire extinguishing agent, such as a garden hose, bucket of water or portable fire extinguisher must be present while the fire is burning.
- The fire must not create an offensive or objectionable condition that interferes with neighboring residents' use and enjoyment of their property. If this occurs, the Fire Department is required to request the responsible person to extinguish the fire.

If you have any other questions regarding fires on your property, please contact Chief Meyer or visit the Ohio EPA Open Burning Laws for more information.

## Safe Boating and River Tips:

As the weather breaks and COVID-19 restrictions are eased, the Maumee River will attract thousands of eager visitors this summer. It's rich scenery, fishing, and water sports, make it a popular destination. If you choose to travel the river, please make sure you wear your life jacket and plan for the conditions. We also encourage you to seek advice from experts before traveling the river. There are several areas of rapids that can be exceptionally dangerous during high water levels and others that are simply impassible for watercraft. Waterville crews respond to a number of water rescues on the Maumee each year were over half of the victims involved, *did not have a personal floatation device on or with them.*

To keep water away from the house foundation, the ground on all four sides are sloped down from the house. If the property is large enough, the run off water is reabsorbed into the subsurface and recharges the water table, without effecting the house foundation.

In the case of present day subdivisions, building lots are too small and concentrated for this to happen. The addition of roads to service these subdivisions provides a solution to this problem. Storm sewer systems that drain the roadways also provide outlets for backyard and side yard areas of the building lots and for the sump pumps located in the basements. In the newest subdivisions the catch basins are located in the back corners of every two lots.

In older subdivisions this space

may be 4 to 6 lots. The back of the lots are set to grade to help drain to these catch basins, this area is often referred to as a drainage easement.

Except for other utilities such as electric, gas, phone, cable TV, etc. that share this easement, no build-ings, sheds, or trees should be in-stalled in this area.

The height of the ground should not be changed without first reviewing the drainage map for your area and the established grade elevations. Remember, if you make any changproperty you could es to your cause an adverse effect on a neighbors property even 3 lots away from you. Some building lots in the Village do not have access to the storm sewer systems and therefore rely on the surrounding ground to provide drainage for those lots.

If you are having backyard drainage problems, here are some items to consider to help solve the problem:

 a) Is your property part of an established drainage system? Some backyards are part of a detention basin and are designed to hold water in heavy storms

- b) Is your property graded correctly to drain to the catch basin?
- c) Did someone change the drainage plan by adding dirt, sheds, trees, catch basin plugged, etc. on their property?
- d) If you are not part of an established drainage system, is the ground on your property frozen? (early spring rains can cause flooding if the ground is still frozen), or mostly impervious (heavy clay or rocky subsurface).
- e) Is your property graded to drain water away from your house? (a word of caution here, you may not run water onto a neighbors property except through an established drainage system).

# Some scammers use cleverly designed phone calls to trick you into handing over personal information or your money!!!

## PHONE SCAMS!!!!

DON'T FALL VICTIM TO PHONE SCAMS!!

ASK YOURSELF:

<u>Could this be a Grandparent Scam?</u>

Scammers may pose as your grandchild in trouble in another city or country, needing money.

- Ask a question only your grandchild would know how to answer.
- Call your son or daughter immediately to confirm the location of your grandchild.

## <u>Could this be an Imposter Scam</u>?

Scammers may pose as well-known government agencies or businesses, such as the IRS. They often disguise the number appearing on caller ID to seem legitimate.

- Do not provide any personal information.
- Hang up the phone & call back using a phone number you know is legitimate.

## <u>Could this be any other type of scam?</u>

- Is there pressure to act immediately?
- Is payment requested by wire transfer, gift card or prepaid money card?
- Is the caller telling you not to tell friends or family about the conversation?
- Is the caller asking you to provide personal information or provide remote access to your computer or other electronic devise?

## FINANCIAL FRAUD & EXPLOITATION AFFECTING SENIORS

## Warning signs of fraud or financial exploitation:

- Unexplained withdrawals from your loved one's bank account, unexplained charges to his or her credit card, or missing cash
- Changes to official documents, such as powers of attorney or wills.
- Unwillingness to disclose information
- Sudden withdrawal from family and friends
- Unpaid bills when the older adult previously paid bills on time and had the resources to pay those bills.
- A new "best friend" who has taken a special interest in your loved one.
- Frequent visits to the bank to wire money or send gift cards.
- Missing belongings

## <u>People who are at risk</u>:

- Older adults who are socially isolated
- Older adults who rely on family members or friends to handle their finances
- Older adults who have recently lost a spouse or loved one, especially if that person handled the household finances.
- Older adults who have a cognitive impairment, memory issues or other disabilities.

## NEW WATERVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT HOUSE CHECK SYSTEM

The Waterville Police Department now has software that allows residents to register a house check or vacation watch from the comfort of your home. If you go to <u>https://www.frontlinepss.com/waterville</u> you will see a box with a blue house icon that says vacation watch. Click on the "submit now" button and that will take you to the vacation watch entry page where you fill out all of the pertinent information. You no longer need to come into the police department to turn in a house check form though we still do have them.

The officers have this program in their in-car computers which has all active business and house checks listed. Every time an officer does a house check he has all of this information that the resident entered right in front of him. If there are no issues then the officer will click a button that the premises check is complete and has the option to make notes if needed. If a problem is observed they would make a note or contact someone if necessary.

If you enter an email address you will receive an email instantly every time an officer checks your property. This should give you extra comfort if you are out of town knowing everything is ok. If you return early or extend your stay you can cancel or extend the watch using this service no matter what time of day or night. It updates your information instantly so you will not have the police knocking on your door if you come home early.
